

Ripley Noir Cheat Sheet

In this detailed tutorial, Anthony Morganti demonstrates how to achieve a classic noir "Ripley" look on photographs (using Lightroom Classic.). The look is inspired by the black-and-white aesthetic of the Netflix series *Ripley*, known for its high-contrast, low-key lighting, with predominant dark areas punctuated by strategic splashes of light that highlight the subject.

Wey Principles

- **In-Camera vs. Post-Processing:** The authentic noir aesthetic is best achieved with proper lighting during photography. This tutorial provides a method to emulate the effect on photos taken with ambient or even lighting.
- **Start Early:** Convert the RAW photo to black and white early in the editing process to guide your subsequent editing decisions.
- **Low-Key Base:** Lower the overall exposure to create a dark foundation for the image.

% Step-by-Step Editing Workflow

- 1. **Black & White Conversion:** Convert your photo to black and white at the beginning of your editing process.
- 2. **Lower Overall Exposure:** Decrease the main exposure to make the image darker and establish a low-key base.
- 3. Create "Splashes of Light" with Radial Gradients:
 - Use radial gradients to selectively brighten specific areas.
 - Inside the gradients:
 - Increase exposure, whites, and clarity.
 - Decrease blacks to enhance contrast.
 - **Pro-Tip:** To duplicate gradients without linking adjustments, use the proper technique demonstrated in the tutorial.

4. Refine with Masks:

- Use subject masks to add texture and clarity to the main subject.
- Use sky masks to enhance the texture and clarity of the sky.

5. Final Touches with a Vignette:

• Apply a dark vignette at the end. This darkens the edges and draws the viewer's focus toward the center of the image, enhancing the noir mood.
